Tips to Improve Pre-Language Skills

- 1. Play Peek-a-boo, Bubbles, Roll a ball back and forth, Hide and Seek
- Model Talk about what your child is looking at, playing with, or is interested in
- 3. Simplify Use single words or short phrases when talking
- Keep Attention Put away electronics, turn off TV, reduce distractions
- 5. Be Expressive Use exaggerated motions, expressions and intonation
- 6. Face to Face Position yourself in front of your child, hold preferred items near your face



As a facilitator, I have enjoyed being able to meet so many wonderful families and helping them become experts in their children's hearing differences. I love building a rapport with each family and helping them feel safe enough to reach out to me with any questions that may arise. I love being a sounding board when they process the variety of emotions and I love seeing the smile on each child's face when I arrive. The relationships we've built are solid, and some extend beyond graduation from CHIP.

My advice to new facilitators is to make sure you build a strong rapport with your families and provide a safe space. Be open to suggestions from the families and be a good listener. Share your wealth of knowledge but know the boundaries so families don't get overwhelmed. Be flexible and patient, meeting each family where they are. Some families just take longer to accept the journey of hearing differences. Cherish your time with each family.
